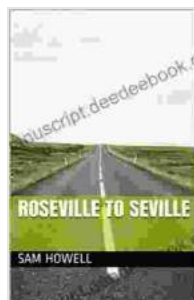


From Roseville to Seville: The Extraordinary Life of Michael Powell

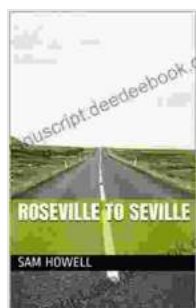

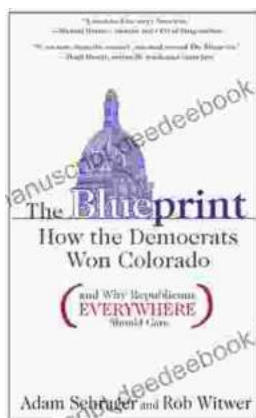
