#### **Materials You'll Need**

- Worsted weight yarn (approximately 200 yards)
- Size US H/8 (5mm) crochet hook
- Yarn needle
- Scissors

#### **Step-by-Step Instructions**

\*\*Step 1: Create a slip knot\*\*

To start, create a slip knot. To do this, make a loop with the yarn, leaving a tail of about 6 inches. Insert the hook into the loop and hook the yarn from the back. Pull the yarn through the loop to tighten. You should now have a slip knot on your hook.

\*\*Step 2: Chain 10\*\*

Chain 10 by making a loop with the yarn over the hook, pulling the yarn through the loop on the hook, and then repeating. You should now have 10 chains on your hook.

\*\*Step 3: Single crochet in the second chain from the hook\*\*

To single crochet (sc),insert the hook into the second chain from the hook. Hook the yarn from the back and pull it through the loop on the hook. Yarn over the hook again and pull the yarn through both loops on the hook. You should now have one single crochet stitch on your hook.

\*\*Step 4: Single crochet in each chain across\*\*

Continue single crocheting in each chain across. You should have 9 single crochet stitches in total.

\*\*Step 5: Join the ends of the row\*\*

To join the ends of the row, slip stitch (sl st) into the first single crochet stitch. To slip stitch, insert the hook into the stitch, hook the yarn from the

back, and pull it through the loop on the hook. You should now have a joined row.

\*\*Step 6: Repeat rows 3-5 until the cowl reaches the desired length\*\*

Continue repeating rows 3-5 until the cowl reaches the desired length. The length of the cowl will depend on the size of your hook and the yarn you are using. For a standard cowl, you will need to crochet about 20-25 rows.

\*\*Step 7: Finish off\*\*

Once you have reached the desired length, cut the yarn, leaving a tail of about 6 inches. Thread the tail through the last stitch on the hook and pull to tighten. Weave in any loose ends.

#### **Tips for Success**

- Use a light-colored yarn so that you can easily see your stitches.
- Hold the yarn and hook comfortably so that you don't get cramps.
- Take your time and don't be afraid to make mistakes. Everyone makes mistakes when they are first learning to crochet.
- If you get stuck, there are many resources available online and in libraries that can help you.

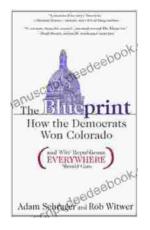
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
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
