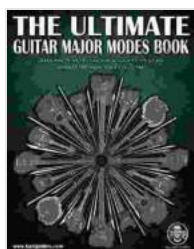
Example of a solo using the Ionian (Major) mode

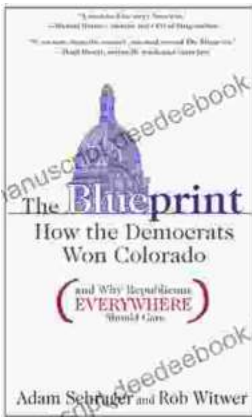
